Graph 1: Distribution of Latinate neologisms in Shakespeare's works As can be seen the tendency to introduce Latinate items is constant over Shakespeare's production period, although after 1600 the number of occurrences is larger and coincides to his mature works, namely Hamlet, Troilus and Cressida, Othello, and King Lear
